## SCHOOL PROFILE, 2019-2020

Eastern Mennonite School was founded in 1917 by the Mennonite Church with the purpose of providing a rigorous academic education, developing ethical thought and behavior, practicing faith expression through the arts, and cultivating a practice of leading through serving. Now a thriving K-12 institution located in the heart of the Shenandoah Valley, the constituency of the school has diversified over the years, but the founding focus has remained the same. Of the 160 students currently enrolled in the high school division, approximately half identify as Mennonite and several are international students hosted through our boarding program.

### Mission & Philosophy of EMHS

Since our founding, students have explored a “whole child” curriculum. Our mission statement captures the vision that a student’s spiritual, academic, ethical, and social needs must be attended to in a variety of ways. EMHS faculty strive to provide an enriching classroom experience for all students. Some students need greater academic challenge and others need adaptation of the curriculum. The scale of our school allows us to attend to these varied needs and provide personalized education.

#### *Faith*

Central to the philosophy and goals of EMHS is a commitment to the Christian faith. We see God as the source of all truth. In our classes, we explore the relationship of Christ’s teachings to academic disciplines and to all of life. Chapel also meets daily for 20 minutes, attended by all faculty and students.

Each student is required to take a semester-long Bible course each year. As part of the senior-level class, Kingdom Living, each senior prepares a 15-20 minute presentation, reflecting upon their spiritual, academic, and co-curricular experiences. Senior presentations are heavily attended and are a meaningful culmination of an EMHS education.

#### *Fine Arts*

We apply the original vision for the school by requiring our students to earn credit in fine arts and the practical arts. Additionally, students uphold the tradition of *a capella* four-part harmony singing in chapel, and approximately over 50% of our juniors and seniors audition for and participate in our select choirs in addition to other academic and co-curricular commitments. The touring and chamber choirs perform at local churches nearly every weekend in the spring, as well as participate in a week-long tour and choir festival. Every other year, the choir travels abroad for several weeks in the summer.

#### *Experiential & Service Learning*

From the start of middle school to the conclusion of the senior year, our students have significant experiences outside our classrooms. Whether through our week-long spring E-Term, class field studies, or participation in our biennial cross-country summer Discovery trip studying sustainability issues, our students have numerous opportunities to engage people and places. Service learning is a part of the middle school program as well as a requirement for National Honor Society and Kingdom Living class for all seniors. The high school also participates in Community Service Day every year, working for organizations, churches, and camps in our community.

### Writing across the Curriculum

Students receive rigorous writing and grammar instruction through courses in the English department at EMHS. However, all courses require significant writing assignments and are graded according to standardized criteria established by the school.

### Gifted Behaviors

Encouraging gifted behaviors (traits characteristic of those who excel) in all students is a challenge we take seriously. Teachers plan course work to develop significant thinking and living skills in each student, believing these gifted behaviors can be encouraged, modeled, and taught to all students regardless of their academic accomplishments. Gifted behaviors include ...

- *the ability to organize and follow through*
- *persistence*
- *strong thinking and reasoning skills*
- *curiosity and insight*
- *a voracious appetite for reading*
- *an expanded vocabulary*
- *leadership skills*
- *managing impulsivity*
- *a confident sense of self*
- *listening with understanding and empathy*
- *clarifying moral right and wrong*

Finally, we encourage students to pay attention to their well-being. Many of our students take rigorous courses, participate in athletics and drama, and are part of choir and orchestra. Given these demands, we encourage students to use one of the eight periods in our day for a study hall, allowing them space to complete assignments during the school day.

### Online Learning, College Courses, & Independent Study

A number of our students pursue online learning. Primary reasons for online learning include the desire to advance in a subject or to take a course not offered at EMHS. Upperclassmen may take college classes at adjacent Eastern Mennonite University, at James Madison University, or at Blue Ridge Community College. College courses receive weighted grade points. Some of our students use their junior or senior year to explore areas of academic and vocational interest through independent study, overseen by a faculty member or local college professor.

### School Year

The 36-week school year is divided into two semesters and four quarters. The school day is divided into eight periods and one 20-minute chapel period.

### Student Ranking

EMHS does not rank students as the small size and composition of our student body does not yield meaningful data. GPA range for the Class of 2020 (40 students) is 2.66 to 4.53.

### National Merit Finalists

Since 1998 we have had 55 commended scholars, 14 finalists and one presidential scholar.

## AP, Dual Enrollment, Honors, & Optional Honors Courses

Honors courses demand an advanced level of research, reading, and critical thinking and are designed for students seeking a challenge in academic work. In Optional Honors courses, students contract individually with the teacher for advanced individual work. All Honors courses receive weighted grade points. *AP and Dual Enrollment courses are generally reserved for Juniors and Seniors.* Because of the rigor of all our classes, *students are discouraged from taking more than two AP/DE classes a year*, but exceptions are made in consultation with our school counselor. *Note: Some courses are not offered every year.*
