

Going to Merge is a relatively new tradition at EMHS, but a common one. Many students buy a drink there before or after a sports practice or another extracurricular. Common Grounds is Eastern Mennonite University's coffee shop, and it's in EMU's gym building, only 3/10ths of a mile, or about a four minute walk from EMHS.
